### SAFETY AND MONEY SAVING

- China is considered a fairly safe place to travel; however, petty crimes such as pick pocketing remain a concern.
- Observe China's laws including customs and currency laws. Understand and respect local customs in China. Do not voice opinions contrary to China's laws publicly.
- $\bullet\,$  Special travel permits are required to travel to Tibet . Do NOT travel to Tibet without authorization.
- Always have your cell phone available when traveling. GPS is widely available on smart phones with internet access and is useful in traveling safely and efficiently.
- You should have your destination as well as contact names and their cell phone numbers written in Chinese characters (not English Pinyin) and English.
- When taking a taxi, ask the hotel staff or your colleague to tell the taxi driver your destination. If not practical, show the driver the address in Chinese characters. Collect receipts from tax drivers in case you have any issues. For your safety, do not hire unauthorized "Black Taxi."
- Use a domestic China mobile phone instead of an expensive calling plan from a foreign carrier for better reception, quicker connection times, and cheaper roaming charges. You can use an unlocked GSM cell phone with a Chinese SIM card. Prepaid SIM cards are available for purchase in most places. Most prepaid cell phone SIM cards allow international calling.
- International Calling Dial from China: dial 00 + country code (1 for U.S.) + area code + number. Domestic Calling - Dial 0 + area code + number. Dial from the U.S. to China 011+86 + number.
- Plan your trip logically; avoid unnecessary loops. USCCC can review your trip and make suggestions.
- Consider alternative routes. For instance, it is less expensive to fly in and out of Shenzhen than Hong Kong.
- If you can travel coach during domestic flights in China, you can save a large amount of money, up to a 90% discount through the right channels and in advance. Please note that coach seating in China is tight.
- China has a well developed railway system with high speed rails that are available for most cities. High speed rail is convenient and may even be faster than air travel. Tickets may be purchased at the station upon departure, but book in advance through the hotel, travel agent or internet. Do NOT buy tickets from unauthorized agents as the tickets may be counterfeit. Avoid train travel during major holidays such as the Spring Festival since trains are overcrowded, and you may be confined to your seat for 20 hours. Allow ample time to check in.
- Avoid rack rates when checking into your hotel in China. Ask for the corporate rate even if you do not have one.
- Control expenses and spending, particularly charges in luxury venues: coffee can cost as much as US\$10.00 per cup and a dinner can cost as much as 10,000 RMB.

	Passport - should have at least six months' validity from the date returning from China; otherwise, there is a slight chance that you might not be allowed to enter the country. In addition, your passport should have at least one blank page for stamps.

### UNDERSTANDING THE TRAVEL DOCUMENTS

### FIGURE 1 - PASSPORT\*\*

Then name on all your travel documents should match the one on your passport "A" and "B," and the "Date of Expiration" - "C," should be at least six months greater than the date of your return.



### FIGURE 2 - CHINA VISA\*\*

Check that that you have a valid visa for the purpose of your trip - "1." You can only enter China between the "Issue Date" - "3" and "Enter Before" - "2." Make sure that you have not used up all the number of "Entries" - "4." "M" means multiple (unlimited) entries. You should NOT stay in China longer than the "Duration of Each Stay" - "5" without special authorization.



# FIGURE 3 - ENTRY CARD

Entry cards are typically distributed during flight and are available at the airport immigration. "Place of Visa Issuance" refers to the Consulate that issues your visa under "Issue at" - "6" in Figure 2 and is written in Chinese. Refer to the following chart to complete the form:
